

A wedding full of wonder

John 2:1-11

Jesus' signs reveal his glory and invite us to trust him.

Your goal

Retell the first sign John records and explain that it points to Jesus' identity.

Read & gather

Read aloud: John 2:1-11. Memory passage: John 2:11.

Basic kit: Bible, paper, pencils or crayons, child-safe scissors, glue or tape. Paper and pencils; no liquids needed.

Read the full passage in context before class. Practice unfamiliar names and select age adaptations.

Words to explain

Sign: an action that points beyond itself. Glory: the greatness and goodness of God made known.

Your 60-minute flow

0-5 minutes | Welcome & wonder

Use the opening question or visual below. Welcome beginners and offer a quiet way to join.

5-10 minutes | Worship & prayer

Offer thanks to God. Sing a familiar, church-approved song or speak a line of praise. Listening quietly is welcome.

10-15 minutes | Bible & memory

Find the reading together. Read the memory passage from your Bible. Repeat short phrases with simple gestures.

15-27 minutes | Discover the story

Read the selected Bible verses and tell the three-part story. Pause for prediction, pointing, and retelling.

27-35 minutes | Talk it through

Use the three discussion questions. Give thinking time, then pair discussion before sharing with the whole group.

35-50 minutes | Create & practice

Demonstrate the activity, work together, and use the student page. Finish drawing at home if time is short.

50-55 minutes | Respond & pray

Connect the big idea with a choice this week. Offer voluntary prayer or quiet reflection.

55-60 minutes | Remember & take home

Use the exit prompt, revisit the big idea, tidy supplies, and give caregivers the family page.

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Welcome & wonder

Show a paper arrow. Ask: Is the arrow the destination? Explain that a sign helps us notice something beyond itself. John calls Jesus' miracles signs.

Tell the story

Read the passage first. The following is an original teaching retelling, not a quotation from the NIV.

1. Jesus, his mother, and his disciples attended a wedding in Cana. During the celebration, the wine ran out. Mary told Jesus about the problem. Jesus answered that his hour had not yet come, and Mary told the servants to do whatever he told them. The story introduces Jesus acting according to his Father's purpose, not merely following people's demands.
2. Six stone jars stood nearby for ceremonial washing. Jesus told the servants to fill them with water. They filled the jars to the brim. Then he told them to take some to the master of the banquet. The water had become wine, and the master was surprised by its quality. The servants knew where it had come from.
3. John tells us that this was the first of Jesus' signs, performed in Cana. It revealed his glory, and his disciples believed in him. We may wonder about the details of how it happened, but John gives us the main point: look at Jesus and trust him. This is not a recipe for making miracles happen or a promise that every party problem will disappear.

The Jesus connection

The signs lead us toward Jesus' greatest work: his death and resurrection for us.

Talk it through

What problem arose at the wedding?

The wine ran out.

What did the servants do?

They filled the jars with water and took some to the banquet master as Jesus directed.

Why does John call this a sign?

It revealed Jesus' glory and led his disciples to believe in him.

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Signs that point to Jesus

1. Draw six simple jars on a page. Label the page John 2:1-11.
2. In pairs, draw an arrow from the jars toward a central statement: Look at who Jesus is.
3. Around the arrow, write or draw three story facts: water, servants, disciples trusting.
4. Compare a sign that gives directions with this biblical sign. Share what the miracle tells us about Jesus rather than pretending to perform it.

Grades 1-2

Count the six jars and draw the water being poured in.

Grades 3-5

Explain the difference between describing what happened and explaining why John recorded it. Offer movement breaks, a quiet space, picture choices, or an adult scribe. Adapt to the child, not only the grade.

Teach with care

Name the wine accurately and simply; no tasting, alcohol, or water-changing demonstration is needed. Avoid turning the story into a trick.

Prayer invitation

Jesus, help us see your glory and trust you.

Exit prompt

Finish: This miracle is a sign because __.

Student page answer guide

1. The wine ran out. 2. They filled the jars with water and took some to the banquet master as Jesus directed. 3. It revealed Jesus' glory and led his disciples to believe in him.

Drawings and personal responses vary. Look for understanding rather than polished artwork.

After class

What did children understand? Whose voice did you hear less? What question will you revisit?

Open the Bible together

Read John 2:1-11. Let your child retell one part. Write down a question to ask a trusted church leader; you do not need to have all the answers.

Start a conversation

What does John want us to notice about Jesus?

Try this during the week

Notice road or building signs together. Read John 2:11 from a Bible and discuss what this sign points to.

A prayer to share

Jesus, help us see your glory and trust you.

Remember together

Look up John 2:11 in your family Bible. Read a short phrase, repeat it together, and ask what it means.

Keep it simple and welcoming

A few unhurried minutes are enough. Children may respond with words, drawings, or gestures. Prayer is an invitation; quiet participation belongs too.
